What role can health journalism play during the COVID-19 pandemic in countries of the Global South? – Impressions from Sub-Saharan health and science journalism organizations


Health/Science journalism organizations primarily pursue the goal of promoting health journalism.

#### Social benefits of health journalism:

- a) Health information and health education
- b) Legitimacy of policy measures to contain SARS-COV-2
- c) Health reporting as feedback option for governments
- d) Combating myths and fake news
- e) Raising public and political awareness

#### Challenges for health reporting:

- a) Lack of contextual knowledge about health issues
- b) Availability of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
- c) Personal consequences of lockdowns for journalists
- d) Restrictions on freedom of the press
